## Specializing by Dr. Rene Manes

Most of us gave up the idea of collecting the whole world long ago. We stopped picking up material from those prolific stamp producers, for example new countries in Africa, Asia or the South Pacific, like Djibouti, Ras Al Khaima or Niuto. That still leaves us with more stamps than our albums can handle.

One way to go is to stop collecting altogether or to stop collecting issues after a certain date, (my cut-off was sometime in the 1970s.) A better solution is offered in a recent article in Linn's March 1st *Collectors Workshop*, i.e. "How to get specialized." Using Germany's military occupations of Luxembourg to make his point, the writer shows how to become expert in a particular topic, person, event or time period.

The article explains how, at a very reasonable cost, you can use the services of the American Philatelic Research Library at the new headquarters or at the [www.stamplibrary.org](http://www.stamplibrary.org) web site to find the material on any special subject; how you can use the internet or read up on the history of your topic for insights on the people and events fea-

tured on your stamps; and how you can often contact directly the authors of books or articles related to your topic. Incidentally you'll be surprised how gladly most will respond to your comments or questions.

It is a great article but it does leave out other useful suggestions. For one thing, some of us haven't given much thought on what to specialize in or on how to narrow down a particular topic. The next problem is our unfamiliarity with all of the information resources available in our hobby.

There are two main sources of help. The first is the American Philatelic Society's (APS) register of APS Affiliated units or study groups. The second is the directory of the American Topical Association (ATA) affiliates and study groups. Note that a few of these affiliated groups belong to both the APS and the ATA.

At this site, scores of key words are given, several of which may refer to a single affiliate. For example, the words Journalists and Poets both refer to JAPOS or "Journalists, Authors and Poets on Stamps." Similarly the separate headings, Gay and Lesbians refer to the "Gays and Lesbians on Stamps" club. The majority of affiliates concern a country but there are many other categories of specialization such as "Cats on Stamps", "Chess", "Churchill", "Bullseye or Smack-on Cancels", etc.

The ATA directory of study units and affiliates lists 52 active units with their dues, contact names, addresses and when available, e-mail addresses and websites. Included among them are the Golf Society, Lighthouse Stamps and Stamps on Stamps Club. There are 33 active ATA chapters, 8 of them overseas but none in Florida. From 1958 to 2003, the ATA has published over 150 handbooks on a great variety of topics. The most voluminous topic seems to have been World Railways with 3 handbooks, 3 supplements and a CD.

If you aren't already specializing why not consider it? It could bring new life to your hobby. If you have ever thought of doing an article on your special interests, the Philatelic Research Library (APRL) and the various affiliate groups will provide invaluable new information. Rene

## Railroad Mail Drop at River, Kentucky by Ed Walters



This is a photo of a an old-time mail drop hook. It is in the area where I was raised in River, Kentucky. The Post Office was on one side of the river and the drop hook and train tracks where on the other side.

The train rarely stopped and did so only because someone wanted a ride. But, the train would always pick up the mail if the bag was on the arm.

If one wanted to catch the train that was a different story. To catch the train it was necessary to cross the Big Sandy River. The only way across the river to catch the train by the mail hook was to walk over a small swinging bridge. Once on the other side of the river the train would have to be flagged down if one was going to catch a ride.

## Identity Uncovered



This stamp has English markings that allow you to start the identification process. The most obvious element of the stamp is the word FRIMARKE.

Research shows FRIMARKE was only printed on the stamps of Denmark, Norway or Sweden. No country name is obvious on the stamp. Under the Universal Postal Union guidelines, stamps that do not have the country name printed can only be used within that country. The only exception to this rule is the stamps of Great Britain. British stamps, which may be mailed from England to any location in the world do not have Great Britain or England printed on the stamp.

Since the cancellation has obliterated part of the second English text on the stamp it will be necessary to search the catalog for an identity. In this case the best place to start is the early issues of the country in question and the back-of-the-book issues such as revenues or local post.

This stamp was not found in Denmark or Norway. It happens to be an early Swedish issue: #38, perf 13 priced used at \$15.00 (Scott 2003).

This stamp does have the country name SVERIGE (meaning Sweden) on it but it is obliterated by the postmark. The simple techniques outlined herein led to the stamps identified in a minimum amount of time.
